Naturally, I am wondering how such respected and admired and informed colleagues could be "cosignatories" to pamphlets I have read from that organization and to such statements as those in the April editorial that, "There is no evidence that current levels of consumption of cholesterol, saturated fats and sugar contribute to any disease in an otherwise healthy person. Over consumption of any food is a problem. There is no reason to separate out these nutrient categories. It would seem prudent for our regulatory agencies to limit their advice or guidelines where the link between environmental factors and the risk of disease is well established." I can't imagine that your scientific evaluation of the evidence indicates no contribution of the diet quality or composition!

The basic thrust of your message seems to be that caloric overconsumption is the main problem in the affluent world. Maybe. You will be interested by Ancel Keys' latest analysis of our Seven Countries findings published last month by Harvard University Press.
