Having the leisure to study in more detail your Section 27 I am more and more enthusiastic for their dissemination as useful guides for the physician, even despite the LVH.

How do you account for the fact that the absolute probability of developing CHD increases little after age 55 in men and not at all after 60, when most other evidence suggests that CHD incidence rises continuously with age? Do we have to worry about adequate numbers of cases here? If so, maybe you could cut off at 60? Is there any way to suggest a meaningful confidence interval around any of the probabilities (at least the average P)?
