But the world is busting wide open around. Nelly's Dad had a cardiac arrest Saturday, June 5, when they sat him up (his third mobilization after his third surgery—all previously well-tolerated). Nelly, her mother, and the grand-children are taking it awfully hard. And I goofed by not getting John over here in time to talk to his grandfather (the real irony is that John, rooming with two Augsburg students, got busted last Friday and the kids had a little something on them. It will go down in the books a gross misdemeanor—I'll probably, with luck have him here on probation). All told—the anxiety quotient is zooming. And besides, I am getting some job offers which, in themselves, tend to destabilize one, even when there is no real intention of being destabilized. I have also authorized Jerry to start exploring with you how we can all best continue to work together. I should much prefer that it be in Minneapolis than in Chicago, but I think we have to look hard at all possibilities and challenges, also weighing in my and our particular strengths and weaknesses.
