Since you are now actively coding ECGs I would appreciate again a letter listing your ideas about points of weakness and ambiguity in the system. I will make one last attempt to strengthen it before giving up. Best regards.

Note to Dr. Barry: Hope the second load of 1/4 inch tape arrived. We can't locate the first shipment sent 1 month ago. Our first order of business will be to use the discriminant function analysis on the CM5 lead, and for this we will need the definite clinical heart cases clearly labelled. Any completed tapes East or West should be sent along to us now by air freight, collect if they will do so. I will keep you and Orma appraised of the status of this study. The eventual comparison with XYZ leads will, of course, involve your active participation in preparing and authoring a manuscript. Astrand gave me one of the pulse rate conversion stop watches. You can always get one through him, as his Stockholm watchmaker simply mounts the photographed face on a standard stop watch.

Note to Dr. Kallio: In order to prepare a suggested outline for the little study on the questionnaires I mentioned to you I need the total number of men examined through Sept. 9 in Ilomantsi. Could you send this to me after mentioning it to Esko?

In your Memo of July 13, you sent us some advices about one-hour oral glucose tolerance test.

I like have as soon as possible the following material and informations:

2) With a 50 g. 1-hour glucose tolerance test at which blood glucose value subjects can be considered positively diabetic and at which interval the borderline diabetics. (Using the true

glucose method of Somogy).

I went trough the literature (cheafly English: a) Stewart W.K., Lancet 2:184, 1963; b) Sharp L.L., Proc. Royal Soc. Med. 57:193, 1964; c) Walker J.B., Lancet 2:246, 1964) and I am convinced that above 150 mg. ml of blood with this test, subjects can be considered diabetic. The borderline interval is 110-149 mg% ml. But I do not have supporting references.

I need that from you, but in very very short time.

Dear Martti:

Thanks for your note and the news of the effective completion of both areas! Now, clearly if we make progress in analysis of the material we can go on. If not it will be serious. I assume you got the cable from Pentti and me from N. Y. C. last week. We must have all tapes by air freight promptly.

In order to make classifications we must have at the earliest possible moment, microfilms of the clinical history and physical. The situation is such here that we can and must punch these clinical data in the next two or three months! Tabulations can be returned to you within 6 or 8 weeks of receipt of the microfilm material. This includes '59 and '64 data.

I assume you will also photocopy or microfilm the material on the deaths.

The unused tape you may hold there. It represents \$400 worth. You are welcome to set up your own amplifiers and record with the Mnemotron tape deck, under the guidance of the young engineer who worked with Pentti. We must have all other apparatus returned to us immediately air freight, including 5 Argonaut amplifiers, control box, telemetry, oscilloscope, etc.

Pentti arrives in a few days and we must get to work.

Thanks for your correspondence, for the cables, and - above all - for the tapes, magnetic or otherwise, which all came in time, once with the margin of 10 minutes only. This added considerably to the excitement of the field study.

I gather from your telegrams that you are now in an equal urgency to get back all the stuff in Minneapolis. Considering that this is my third day in Helsinki, I feel that we have already achieved something. All the tapes are packed and are being cleared through the customs now. The medical records from Ilomantsi have been photographed and will be sent to you together with the tapes. The 1959 medical records have also been photographed, and will be sent to you within a few days. The 1964 records of the west are being arranged, and a photographic copy will soon be in your hands.

As to the equipment, I understood that Pentti had agreed to carry on a cooperative study with Robin Herron, with the definite aim of being able to tape pulse waves in Italy next spring and to analyse them with Pentti's sophisticated methods. As you will appreciate, it will be essentially easier to do this, if we have the necessary equipment at our disposal. Robin Herron gave to me the following list:

Mnemotron Modulator-Demodulator

-"- Tape Recorder

Power Supply Microvolt Calibrator

Oscilloscope with "Differential Amplifier" and "A Trace" plug-ins. 2 Argonaut Differential Preamplifiers.

All other equipment we are now collecting and packing for sending to you.

Of course, we shall be delighted to cooperate with Pentti even without equipment. One possibility is to start buying oscilloscopes, preamplifiers etc. to replace the stuff you request.

Dear Martti:

I hasten to answer your entertaining and sardonic letter, and to thank you for the splendid work done in collecting such excellent data. One package of 9 reels of 1/2 tapes recorded in W. Finland, one package of 25 reels of 1/4 tape, and one package of microfilm arrived. The E. Finland 1/2 tapes have not come, and presumably will, but you might want to check at your end.

We finally discovered how it was the earlier shipment of tape went to you by surface rather than air mail, but there's no use in belaboring the issue.

Work has started on all lines to make use of these data. You should know, by reading between lines, that we must get something going on them or there will be no more applications in the field next Spring or any other time. For 3 years we have been putting stuff on tape with no good results. Pentti has done the major effort in this, but only as a "spare time project, and it is a big blow to our future plans his not coming here. Nevertheless, I have worked and finagled, and all here have chiseled from budgets, for four years to finally assemble the equipment you so graciously accept as a gift, and now we must make best use of it. From that standpoint only there is logic in your letter. We are all anxious to develop methods in this field and you have some boys with the capacity to do this. We want the equipment where it can best be used, at this time.

However, it is clear that we cannot proceed without our oscilloscope which must be returned at once with the early air freight shipment. Pentti will be here in 2 days and I m sure you'll accept whatever decision is made about the calibrator and 2 amplifiers at that time. We will try to arrange to replace them, but Pentti informed me earlier you could record on tape, using the Elema amplifiers, into the Mnemotron Unit which will stay with you.

Our A-D conversion is working and we have good computer programmers.

Dear Henry,

You may be interested to hear from our progress. The sending of the cholesterols has been delayed, due to the circumstance that the particular type and size of filter paper your laboratory prefers was not available in this country. I expect that this phase of the work will soon be started.

Mosterday we discussed the future of the ecg:s. We agreed that Kallio will reread blindly all the series, and that Sven Punsar will also read all the ecg:s. Some of the existing discrepancies are due to slight shifts in the criteria between Mohacek, Nedeljkovic, and Kallio. Kallio will write down directives for these points. After having all these readings available, Kallio and Sven will go through all the discrepancies and make a decision on each ecg for coding.

In order to treat the series as <u>subjects</u>, not only as <u>clinical</u> forms or ecg:s, we must agree on the principles of classification. Are we going to define all the following categories, and if so, how?

- A. Probable IHD
 - 1. Angina pectoris
 - 2a.Recent infarction
 - 2b.01d infarction
- B. Possible IHD
 - 1. Sudden death
 - 2. Atypic angina pectoris
 - 3. Decompensation, not explainable by other disease
 - 4. Arrhythmia, not explainable by other disease
 - 5. Enlarged heart, not explainable by other disease
 - 6. ST and T changes at rest or after exercise (when not digitalis has been used)

If we want to proceed with the analysis of our data along the lines you have suggested - and we definitely want - a decision on this point is urgently needed.

Equally urgent is a copy of the ecg results of 1959. Neither Esko nor myself have seen received that document from Minneapolis.

Due to an unfortunate misunderstanding between Esko and myself, the information on dysphoea was not recorded at all. We tried to remedy the situation by sending a questionary to all the participants. A list of the answers will be sent to you as soon as most of the answers will have arrived.

The miniature chest x-rays have been read by a lung specialist. A roentgenologist specialized in cardiology will read them again, and also measure the heart sizes.

In what form do you wish other information to be transferred to you? Are you satisfied with the smoking code? How about the pulmonary information?

We have now increased the strength of our statistical department, and I believe that we could process a lot of our data in foreseeable future.

I hope to hear from you soon.

Henry Blackburn will write to you about the plans for the field work (5-year follow-up) at Crevalcore and Montegiorgio. Briefly, it appears to be possible for us to have an engineer working with E.C.G. tape recording for the 30 days or so in each place. Penti and Henry B. expect to be on the scene for the week of meetings in Venice and about two weeks thereafter, for work at Montegiorgio starting about April 20.

Andy Dontas will be in Italy for about five weeks, either arriving at Crevalcore for the start of work there on March 10 and staying through the Venice meetings of staying on for the work at Montegiorgio finishing about May 20.

This is to advise you that I have been able to set aside \$750 for Dr. Herron to work with the team in both Crevalcore and Montegiorgio where, presumably, he would be mainly engaged in pulse wave recording. This sum should cover living expenses. I estimate the latter at perhaps \$10-\$12 a day for Crevalcore (staying in Bologna), \$9-\$10 a day for Montegiorgio (staying at Fermo) and \$15 a day at Venice. Can you provide Dr. Herron's transportation? And are these arrangements suitable?

I am sending a copy of this letter to Andy who will, I trust, be in touch by mail with you or Dr. Herron.

At Venice we shall have a good attendance. Margaria, Donald Reid, Geoffrey Rose, and many others about whom you probably know already, will be with us.

Concerning Corfu the date of death of the people in your letter are: No. 155, October 24,1962. No.335, April 8,1962 and No. 671, April 24, 1963. Detailed data on dead people will be sent to you in the near future after a personal visit to Corfu.

I spoke to you long time ago about a desk of all E.C.G. data from both studies in Crete and Corfu, with the clinical diagnosis, the B.P., the body weight and fatness and the cholesterol. Would you be so kind to send me these data at your earliest convenience.
