Dear Editor:

The total amount of funding for research at the University is an important figure for the community to know. This funding not only represents the national leadership of the University in scientific research, but is directly tied to other government funding such as Indirect Cost Recovery funds which allow new developments across the campus to stimulate research, and BRSG grant awards to beginning researchers.

I would like to express my concern in this note; in fact, my embarrassment, that you have included me in your list of awardees based on the simple criterion of number of dollars awarded! That, in my view, is not a wholly appropriate criterion for reporting research by a thoughtful publication of the University. It is an embarrassment to the research leaders of our fine institution. Would not an orientation of your reportage toward the nature of the research, its basic or clinical contributions, or its outreach and significance to the broader community, be a much more useful and appropriate representation to University research activities?

If you insist on your First Amendment rights to report this public information, of the actual number of National Institutes of Health dollars that I have personally played a direct role in bringing to research activities at the University of Minnesota, there is obviously nothing I can do. I can here indicate my strong feeling about the "unhappy" orientation of your report. It "just ain't fittin'!" Why not talk about what University people really do for people rather than simply about the money they bring into the community?
